Signing of a Memorandum of Understanding with The Embassy of Canada to Japan

Tokyo, July 29th, 2019---The Shoko Chukin Bank, Ltd ("Shoko Chukin Bank")has signed a Memorandum of Understanding(MOU) with the Embassy of Canada to Japan (Trade Commissioner Service)(*).Shoko Chukin Bank is the first Japanese financial institution to sign such MOU with the Trade Commissioner Service.
